WHERE DO I START?

Deciding which program you want to take part in can be one of the most exciting yet challenging parts of the planning process of studying away from NDSU. When you are planning, think about your academic plans, finances, what kind of experience you want to have, and where you want to be. The questions below might help you to identify what is important to you when you are exploring your options.

BASICS

- Why do I want to study abroad?
- Where do I want to go? Why do I want to go there?
- Are there other locations that offer the same benefits (even places I never thought about going to before)?
- When do I want to go and for how long?
- Which program type is best for me?

COSTS

- Does this program offer the best combination of what I want and a cost I can afford?
- What's included in the program fees?
- Are there scholarships I can apply for that will help with the cost?

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- Is this program open to all students?
- Is there a minimum GPA requirement?
- Is the program for specific majors/ year in school?

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ACADEMICS

- Are there classes offered in my major/ minor?
- Are there interesting classes outside
 my major/minor?
- In what language are courses taught? If needed, are there introductory language courses?
- Are classes primarily with local students or other international/ American students?

LIVING ARRANGEMENTS

- Host families/dorms/apartments/ other?
- With other international students, Americans or local students?
- How are meals arranged? Are meals included, or do I purchase or make them myself?

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- Am I prepared mentally, physically, and academically?
- Do I want to travel/work/volunteer before or after the program?

WHEN CAN I GO?

NATIONAL STUDENT EXCHANGE

The National Student Exchange (NSE) Program offers more than 150 options for exchange within the U.S. and Canada. Placement within NSE programs is a competitive process, where students will choose a few schools and be placed at one.

NSE has two payment options: Direct and Exchange. Students may either pay NDSU tuition or the resident tuition of their placed university. Some locations are less than NDSU tuition, making it an affordable option.



EXCHANGE (Global Practicum)

There are two kinds of international exchange program options available: Partner Exchange and ISEP Exchange. Students taking part in an exchange program typically are taking classes at the university and have an opportunity to get to know local students well in their day to day life. All of these exchange program types have the same tuition and fees as a semester at NDSU.

These programs keep the semester cost as similar as possible to a semester at NDSU. ISEP exchange has a competitive placement process while we can send you on Partner Exchange as long as you meet the eligibility requirements.



DIRECT (Global Practicum)

Partner Direct and ISEP Direct programs are available. Students taking part in Direct programs are typically taking classes at the local university. Direct programs are often located in popular locations, but may offer the opportunity to learn or practice a language as well.

Students attending a Direct program will have NDSU tuition waived as they will be paying the host university's tuition and students are responsible for room, meals, airfare and personal spending money at the local rates.



GLOBAL SEMINAR

Travel with NDSU students and faculty to explore a class topic together during one of these NDSU-led Global Seminars abroad while paying NDSU tuition and your travel costs. Courses are NDSU credits, taught by NDSU faculty.

Program times ranges from a week or as long as a semester. While on the program, students take NDSU classes, making the process for planning how to use courses even easier. Students also pay a program fee which often includes costs such as room, board, in-country travel, health insurance and airfare. Other costs, such as personal expenses and some meals, are the responsibility of the student.

AFFILIATE (Global Practicum)

NDSU works with affiliate providers in order to offer students an even wider range of study abroad options. Affiliate programs may also offer opportunities such as built in excursions and cultural events.

When taking part in an Affiliate program, NDSU tuition is waived as students will pay the affiliate provider's program fee. Many providers include costs such as tuition, room, meals, health insurance, excursions, etc. in the program fee. Each provider is different, so please be sure to research exactly what your program fee includes.





OTHER GLOBAL EXPERIENCES

NDSU offers other opportunities other than the traditional study abroad experience. Some majors have experiential requirements such as internships, volunteering, student teaching, reasearch, and field studies. Students can fulfill these requirements while abroad in career fields unique to their locations

Earn NDSU credits, fulfill degree requirements, and gain hands-on experience in your desired career field while partcipating in one of these other global experiences.

ACADEMICS

Planning the academic component of your study abroad experience is an important part of the preparation but it doesn't have to be complicated. You can use the courses you take abroad to fulfill requirements for graduation, and many students get their courses preapproved so they know what to expect when they return. The type of program you choose affects this process and how the courses show on your transcript at NDSU afterwards. These two pages offer a brief overview.

GLOBAL PRACTICUMS (EXCHANGE, DIRECT, AFFILIATE)

All NDSU students studying abroad on one of these credit-bearing programs are registered for NDSU general GLBL 492 study abroad credits in order to retain full-time status, use their NDSU email account, retain financial aid, and be able to have course equivalencies pre-approved. Courses abroad return as transfer credits, which are evaluated on a Pass/Fail basis. These courses can be used to complete requirements at NDSU.

General Credits

If you just need credits but not specific courses, you do not need to complete any additional paperwork to complete this transfer. The transfer will happen automatically once NDSU receives and processes your transcript from your term abroad.

Major and Minor Requirements

Academic departments at NDSU can sign off on the Request to Waive/Substitution Form to approve the course equivalencies, and then as long as you take the course abroad at your accredited university it will complete the requirements fulfilled by that course at NDSU. This can be done before, during or even shortly after you return from your study abroad program.

General Education Requirements

- 1. 3 credits of GLBL 492, when completed successfully and transferred back to NDSU, will qualify for either Cultural Diversity or Global Perspectives credits
- 2. 6+ credits of GLBL 492, when completed successfully and transferred back to NDSU, will qualify for both Cultural Diversity and Global Perspectives credit.

For other courses and/or general education requirements you can complete the Appeal General Education Requirements form found on the NDSU OneStop website, explaining concisely how the proposed course will fit into the general education category description from the Undergraduate Bulletin.

NDSU GLOBAL SEMINARS & INTERNSHIPS

Because these courses are taught by an NDSU instructor, the course numbers are predetermined for these programs and courses will show on the transcript as NDSU courses with a letter grade. Courses may fulfill certain degree requirements as based on their course number, but check with the faculty leader and/or your department for more details. If you would like to use a course to fulfill a requirement that is not pre-approved, you can complete the appropriate form.

Major and Minor Requirements

Your department can approve class substitutions using the Substitute/ Waive a Course form. Talk with your department to see if they are able to approve this substitution.

General Education Requirements

You can complete the Appeal General Education Requirements form found on the NDSU OneStop website, explaining concisely how the proposed course will fit into the general education category description from the Undergraduate Bulletin.

RELATED MAJORS

In addition to adding study abroad to your experiences and your resume, two options exist to also incorporate the learning as a secondary major.

Global Studies Major

The Global Studies Major is designed to provide students with a comprehensive understanding of global issues, international relations, and cross-cultural communication. This program combines coursework from various fields to prepare students for careers in a global setting.

Global Business Major

The Global Business Major is a secondary major for business majors that combines global business courses with language training and an in-depth study abroad experience to qualify students for management positions in diverse, multicultural and international environments.

FINANCES

FINANCIAL AID AND PRIVATE LOANS

Students currently receiving financial aid who are enrolled full-time in a study abroad program are eligible to use that aid toward paying their program costs. Study abroad budget estimates include costs such as your airline ticket, passport, visa, and spending money. During the term you will be abroad, your financial aid and loans will disburse into your student account, pay on anything due to NDSU, and then any extra will be refunded to you to pay for additional expenses.

Planning your finances is a two part process:

- 1. Once you have started an application, finalize your budget with your study abroad advisor, then
- 2. Meet with an advisor in the Office of Financial Aid and Scholarships to discuss financial planning.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Students are highly encouraged to apply for study abroad scholarships. It's best to start looking at scholarships early, but the application process doesn't have to be difficult. Many scholarships ask for similar materials, so if you apply for one you're ahead in starting each additional application.

Deadlines

October 1st for winter break, spring break, spring and summer programs.

March 1st summer, fall, and academic year programs.

Can any major study abroad?

Yes! Any major can study abroad. Talk with your academic advisor early to determine when is the best time for you to go.
