Post-Graduation Opportunities Abroad

Resource Document

This document was created as a resource for Binghamton University students interested in exploring post-graduate opportunities abroad. It will be updated from time to time as additional opportunities are curated. It is not a completely comprehensive list of all opportunities, but some of the more well-known ones. Many of them are also geared towards U.S. citizens or residents. If you are an international student, you may have even more opportunities based on your country of citizenship! This document is a resource for students; Binghamton University does not necessarily endorse any of these opportunities.

Some Tips to Get Started:

- Talk to as many people as possible! There are many opportunities out there; one of the best ways to discover and learn about them is to try to find someone who has done it before.
- **Beware of scams.** Make sure to fully research and vet each opportunity before committing/sending any money or personal information
- Build your international IQ before your opportunity abroad! Cultural competence is important, as is intercultural communication. Get engaged with the international community here at Binghamton by joining clubs, getting involved with <u>International</u> <u>Student & Scholar Services</u> (ISSS) events, declaring a <u>Global Studies Minor</u>, or looking into <u>Education Abroad</u>.
- **Do lots of research.** Make sure you fully understand the opportunity you choose, in addition to the location you choose.
- **Get comfortable with the unknown.** Have a plan, but understand not everything will go to plan.
- Plan early and have a plan B (and C, and D). Things may not go to plan, but it does not mean that planning is unimportant. Plans help you mitigate unexpected challenges.
- Get acquainted with the language and legality of moving abroad. Visas, residence
 permits, working rights, etc. are very important to understand before embarking on an
 experience. Even understanding what your rights are for remaining in your location after
 your opportunity ends (i.e., are you legally able to stay and work in your host country
 once your graduate program is completed?). You may wish to reach out to the
 host-country consulate, employer, and/or an immigration lawyer to ensure that you have
 the proper immigration guidance.
- Know your field, know the needs of your location. Which occupations are in demand in the location you want to move to? Which are not? Is it easier to move to a certain location if you have a degree/experience in a certain area?
- Consider graduate school abroad. If you are looking to continue your education and are interested in overseas experiences, then maybe you could consider getting your graduate degree from an international institution.
